1503-D: Waiver of Liability

1503-D: Parents shall not be required to waive the center's responsibility.

Finding:

1503-D Based on record review: Parents are required to waive the provider's responsibility in the event of an accident or injury as documented on the children's mastercards.

-The 'Consent to Medical Care and Treatment' in the children's files is signed by the parent and reads:

"In the event that I cannot be reached immediately, medical or surgical treatment can be administrated to my child in the case of an accident or emergency, as prescribed by a treating physician, and hold Room to Grow Daycare, Preschool & Learning Center Inc. and its employees harmless".

1509-A.9: Electronic Devices Policy

1509-A.9: Electronic Devices Policy that provides that all activities involving electronic devices, including but not limited to television, movies, games, videos, computers and hand held electronic devices, shall adhere to the following limitations:

- a. Electronic device activities for children under age two are prohibited; and
- b. Time allowed for electronic device activities for children ages 2 and above shall not exceed 2 hours per day.

Finding:

1509-A.9 Based on observations/interview(s): The center failed to have an electronic devices policy and children under the age of two were allowed to watch television.

-Specialist observed a television in the infant classroom and S3, staff in the infant room, stated that movies are played on the television for the children and showed Specialist that the movie Shark Tales was in the movie player.

1725-A.-D.: Medication Management Training

1725-A.-D.: A. All staff members who administer medication shall have medication administration training.

B. Whether administering medication or not, each early learning center shall have at least two staff members trained in medication administration.

- C. Such training shall be completed every two years with an approved Child Care Health Consultant.
- D. A licensed practical nurse (LPN) or registered nurse (RN) with a valid nursing license shall be considered to have medication administration training.

Finding:

1725-A.-D. Based on record review: The provider did not have at least two staff members trained in medication administration whether the early learning center administers medication or not.

-This training expired in January 2017 for all staff.

1901-J.&K.: Items That Can be Harmful to Children

1901-J.&K.: Items that can be harmful to children, such as medications, poisons, cleaning supplies and chemicals, and equipment, tools, knives and other potentially dangerous utensils, shall kept in a locked cabinet or other secure place that ensures they are inaccessible to children. Plastic bags, when not in use, regardless of purpose or use, shall be made inaccessible to children.

Finding:

1901-J. & K.: Based on observations: Items that can be harmful to children, such as medications, poisons, cleaning supplies and chemicals, and equipment, tools, knives and other potentially dangerous utensils, were not kept in a locked cabinet or other secure place that ensures they are inaccessible to children.

-Specialist observed a candle wax warmer on a ledge by the television in the infant classroom. This warmer was on and contained hot melted wax on the top open tray. Specialist had staff remove this while present.

1909-B: Infants Placed on Backs for Sleeping

1909-B: All infants shall be placed on their backs for sleeping.

- 1. Written authorization from a physician is required for any other sleeping position.
- 2. Written notice of the specifically authorized sleeping position shall be posted on or near the crib.

1909-B Based on observations/record review: Infants were not placed on their backs for sleeping as evidenced by:
