Statement of Deficiencies

1711-H: Rest Time - Minimum Child to Staff Ratio

1711-H: Rest Time - Minimum Child to Staff Ratios

1. Sufficient staffing needed to satisfy child to staff ratios shall be present on the premises during rest time and available to assist as needed.

2. Children ages one and older may be grouped together at rest time with one staff member in each room supervising the resting children. If two rooms share a common doorway, one staff member may supervise the resting children in both rooms.

3. If the view of the staff supervising the children is obstructed by an object such as a low shelving unit, children shall be checked by sight by staff circulating among the resting children.

Finding:

1711-H Based on observations: Provider had children under the age of one grouped together with older children at rest time. As specialist observed S3 with 10 children ages 4 month to 1 year old. S1 stated that she thought the children could be combined for nap time.

1725-A.-D.: Medication Management Training

1725-A.-D.: A. All staff members who administer medication shall have medication administration training.

B. Whether administering medication or not, each early learning center shall have at least two staff members trained in medication administration.

C. Such training shall be completed every two years with an approved Child Care Health Consultant.

D. A licensed practical nurse (LPN) or registered nurse (RN) with a valid nursing license shall be considered to have medication administration training.

Finding:

1725-A.-D. Based on record review: The provider did not have at least two staff members trained in medication administration whether the early learning center administers medication or not.

1903-C: Free of Hazards

1903-C: Indoor and outdoor areas shall be free of hazards.

Finding:

1903-C Based on observations:

The indoor and outdoor area were not free of hazards as specialist observed an active ant pile on play ground that could cause a child to be harmed. S3 poured ant killer on pile during specialist visit.

1911-E: Daily Reports for Infants

1911-E: Daily Reports for Infants. Written reports that include the liquid intake, food intake, disposition, bowel movements and eating and sleeping patterns shall be given to the parents of infants on a daily basis. Reports shall be kept current throughout the day.

Finding:

1911-E Based on interview(s): S3 lacked a daily written report for 5 of 5 infants. S3 stated that she thought that she completed the daily infants reports, but she could not locate them. S3 completed during specialist visit.

1911-G: Pacifier Attached

1911-G: Pacifiers attached to strings or ribbons shall not be placed around the neck or attached to the clothing of a child.

Finding:

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1911-G Based on observations: Specialist observed A pacifier that was attached to strings and attached to the clothing of a child. S2 stated that they have informed the parents of this policy, but the parents do not follow.
