

Statement of Deficiencies

1103.A.-D.: Critical Incidents and Required Notifications

Not Met

1103.A.-D.: An early learning center shall make immediate notification to emergency personnel, law enforcement as applicable, and other appropriate agencies for the following types of critical incidents involving children in care:

1. death;
 2. serious injury or illness that required medical attention;
 3. reportable infectious diseases and conditions listed in LAC 51.II.105; and
 4. any other significant event relating to the health, safety, or well-being of any child, including but not limited to a lost child, an emergency situation, fire or other structural damage, or closure of the center.
- B. The parent shall be contacted immediately following any immediate notifications made under Subsection A.
- C. The department and other appropriate agencies shall be notified via email within 24 hours of the incident.
- D. The department shall be notified by written report within 24 hours of the incident or the next business day. This written notification shall be made on the department's Critical Incidents Report Form and shall contain all information requested on the form.

Finding:

1103.A.-D. Based on observations/record review/interview(s): The department shall be notified by written report within 24 hours of the incident or the next business day. This written notification shall be made on the department's Critical Incidents Report Form and shall contain all information requested on the form. 12:14 pm Specialist interviewed S1 about any incidents occurring in the infant room regarding the bottles not being labeled. S1 stated that a long time ago, possibly last winter, S3 gave the wrong breast-milk to an infant. S3 gave C1, C2's breastmilk. S1 stated that the parents were contacted immediately, and their were no complaints or issues from the parents. S1 stated they did not document the incident, nor did they notify the department.

1919.J.: Bottled Formula/Breast Milk Properly Labeled

Not Met

1919.J.: Bottled formula/breast milk for infants shall be labeled with the child's name.

Finding:

1919.J. Based on observations/interview(s): Center did not have bottle formula/breast milk for infants labeled with the child's name : At 10:35 AM Specialist observed 4 infants in the classroom with S3. Specialist observed bottles in a lunch bag in the fridge, in which S3 stated those were for one child, but the bottles were not labeled. Specialist observed two bottles on the counter that were not labeled, and one bottle in the cabinet that was not labeled next to a bottle with initials on the top of the bottle. S3 stated that the parents usually do label the bottles. Specialist advised S1, S2, and S3 that they check the bottles every day upon the children arriving and make sure they are labeled.
